**OLDHAM METROPOLITAN BOROUGH COUNCIL
STATUTORY DECLARATIONS**

1. Every applicant for the renewal of certain licences is required to submit to the Council a statutory Declaration indicating whether or not he or she has been convicted of any offences and as to material changes in health circumstances.
2. The Declaration must be sworn in the presence of a Solicitor who is qualified to administer oaths. Any Solicitor's fees ,must be borne by the applicant.
3. The applicant is not required to disclose any convictions he may have for matrimonial offence (eg failure to pay maintenance). Judgements of the County Court for non-payment of debts are not offences and should not, therefore be included on the declarations.
4. The applicant should state, wherever possible the date of any conviction. If, however, he cannot remember this, he should give an approximation rather than omit to declare it.
5. The applicant need only disclose material (ie significant) changes in health circumstances eg current disablement and illnesses likely to impair current state of health or current or future fitness to drive the public. Minor illnesses which do not have lasting effects need not be disclosed.
6. NOTE - By Section 5 of the Perjury Act, 1911 it is an offence punishable by up to two years imprisonment or a fine, or both, knowingly and wilfully to make in a Statutory Declaration a statement false in any material particular.
